# WE ARE THE NEW BRITAIN PROJECT

The New Britain Project is an independent progressive think tank focused on bridging the gap between politics, policy and practice.

As Britain confronts urgent and multifaceted challenges, there's a real danger we slide into managed decline, unless we champion pragmatic and workable solutions that fully acknowledge both the scale and inherent constraints of the task ahead.

We hold that it's not solely a crisis of ideas; history has shown us that even the most well intentioned policy solutions often fail when faced with the complexities of real world execution.

In response, our research will be centred on delivery. We are assembling a group of fellows with direct experience of government as well as new thinkers with frontline experience in industry and public services.

Together, we aim to understand the root causes of past policy failures and provide practical insights to drive successful change in the months and years ahead.



### BRITAIN IS BROKEN AND ITS PEOPLE FEEL BROKEN TOO

The New Britain Project's poll is one of the most comprehensive studies undertaken into the depth of malaise among the British public. Not only does it shed light on the magnitude of the transformation required to overcome this dissatisfaction, but also reveals the varying degrees of willingness among people to support such change.

At the heart of the findings is an overwhelming concern that nothing works anymore, and that the social contract has broken down.

"When 58% of people think nothing in our country works anymore, and just 21% have any faith in politicians' ability to sort things out, then we have a real problem. Britain clearly needs a serious rethink."



### POLL RESULTS AT A GLANCE

A devastating poll, released to mark the launch of The New Britain Project, underscores the mammoth challenges any incoming government would face after the next election.

The data reveals a stark picture: a majority of Britons believe the nation is in decline. A dismal 30% retain optimism for the future, with 58% believing that nothing in Britain works anymore, and 76% believing we're going backwards. The social contract is seen as broken by 62% of respondents.

Disillusionment is even greater in the so-called 'red wall' - 76% believing nothing in Britain works anymore, 91% believe things are worse than before and a staggering 80% believing the social contract has broken down.

Britons see the country as struggling to match its global counterparts, with nearly 60% expressing concerns over the UK's ability to prepare for the future. Personal disillusionment is also rampant - 45% feel they're not realising their potential, while 48% feel they lack control over their own life.

The poll shows political distrust is pervasive. Only 14% are convinced politicians prioritise national interests, while public confidence in politicians' capability to resolve pressing national issues stands at just 21%.




To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements:


### **Britain is broken - resonates most with Labour voters**

#### Scotland and Wales feel the most despairing





#### Gen X most likely to feel Britain is broken





# The blue wall and red wall are living on different planets




To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements:



#### Gen X feel they have the least agency



#### And it feels personal to Labour voters





#### **Britons lack optimism about the future**




To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements: I'm optimistic about the future of Britain



### Wales and Scotland are the least optimistic about the future




To what extent do you agree with the following statement: I'm optimistic about the future of Britain

### People think the UK is failing to keep up with peer nations in preparing for the future














### The public are torn on the need for a shake up of public services



Which do you agree with more?:





### People have more confidence in solutions closer to home




In the future, what impact do you think the following will have on solving the country's biggest problems?:

What are your main hesitations, if any, about voting for a political party whose manifesto proposed a major shake up to improve our public services? Please select up to two.




In the future, what impact do you think the following will have on solving the country's biggest problems?





What would be your main hesitations if any about voting Labour? Select all that apply.



### Voters in the red wall are most worried about immigration




What would be your main hesitations if any about voting Labour? Select all that apply.

### **METHODOLOGY**

| Fieldwork dates                | 12th to 15th May 2023   |
|--------------------------------|---|
| Interview method               | Online  |
| Sample size                    | 2,017 adults aged 18+   |
| Population effectively sampled | All voters, Great Britain (NI excluded)   |
| Weighting method               | The data is weighted on several measures - age/gender interlocked, education, ethnicity, and region - all to nationally representative proportions. In addition, it is also weighted by 2019 GE vote (of registered voters) |
| Polisters                      | More in Common  |
